Message from the Parish Nurse

Come Along With Me

When Jesus called Peter and Andrew, He told them, "Put down your nets and follow Me. I will make you fishers of men." Without hesitation, they dropped their nets — their very livelihood — and followed this stranger on the journey of His life, a path directed by God. In many ways, a parish nurse's journey, while different, also answers a calling from God.

Being a parish nurse is a journey filled with both joy and sorrow. There are moments of laughter shared with patients, but also moments of deep sadness as I walk with them and their families through difficult diagnoses and end-of-life decisions. More times than I can count, I've sat in my car in the parking garage at Vassar Medical Center, mopping up tears after a pastoral care visit. Life has a way of unfolding whether we are ready for it or not — and often, our plans do not match God's plans.

Each Sunday morning, people visit my office for many reasons: to have their blood pressure checked, to ask about test results, to seek advice on medical decisions, or simply to share how they're doing. These conversations often start simply, but sometimes they take unexpected turns. What seems like a minor issue can lead to surgery and rehabilitation. Sometimes, a diagnosis can worsen, leading to hospital stays, home care, or, sadly, even a funeral. I've walked this road with several beloved members of our congregation. I often remind people: wherever your journey takes you — hospital, rehab, long-term care, or beyond — I'll be there. That's why there are many tearful moments for me in that parking garage.

As a parish nurse, I don't just get to know my patients — I get to know their families, and yes, even their pets. It's one of the hardest jobs I've ever had, but also one of the most meaningful.

Through the Parish Nurse program, I've served in many roles: as a health counselor, an educator, a guide through the healthcare system, and a bridge between our congregation and the wider medical community. Pastoral care has brought me to rehab centers, nursing homes, funeral homes, and funeral services. Over the years, I've seen something wonderful too: you are taking better care of yourselves, honoring the gift of life God has given you. You're becoming more informed and more responsible about your health. Keep it up — it's inspiring to see!

We all have an "end date" written on us, but the real goal is to live life fully until that day comes.

The Appalachian Service Project

Twenty years ago Freedom Plains began its work with The Appalachian Service Project (ASP), under the leadership of The Rev. Paul Lent. ASP is a non-governmental organization that was founded in 1969 by a Christian man named "Tex" Evans. Tex was known to say, "We accept people right where they are, just the way they are." ASP works to

better the lives of people living in substandard housing in Appalachia.

This year we will bring another group of youth and adult volunteers down to Clay County, West Virginia to help make people's homes "warmer, safer & dryer" by doing high impact home repairs. We will leave on July 12th and return on July 19th. Part of the experience is befriending our home owners and sometimes making lasting friendships. We sleep in local churches or school buildings and we eat food

often prepared by local people from the community.

Our groups have built ramps, painted walls, done underpinning, we have hung siding, we have put on new roofs, and laid new floors. We have taken walls down and built fresh new ones in their place. We have used jigsaws, table saws, chop saws and miter saws. Some people are partial to using the circular saw because it can cut through REBAR, which feels pretty powerful.

Earth Stewards Committee- Love The Earth Garden

A history of the garden

In 2022, the Earth Stewards decided to start a pollinator garden on church property. Basically, we wanted to do our part to help pollinators: bees, birds, butterflies, and other insects that are in decline.

The property committee set aside an area for the garden that was larger than the Earth Stewards had envisioned, but we forged ahead undaunted. We hired an expert to provide a garden design namely master ecological gardener Karin Ursula Edmondson. The design included mostly native plants and some cultivars that tolerate droughts, torrential rains and rising temperatures and provide food to pollinator insects and birds. In the fall of 2022, we hired Roger Landscaping to level and construct the paths and put down topsoil. We secured three rain barrels to allow us to collect 1000 gal of rainwater from the roof. Neil Townsend and



the Earth Stewards designed and constructed a water collection lso contributed much needed funding for the construction and plant costs.

Planting began in the spring of 2023 and continued in the fall of 2023. Many church members helped with planting and mulching as well as friends from the community, Arlington High School students, and Cub Scouts from Troop 182. The rain barrels and water delivery system with some buried drip hoses, were critical that year to be able to start the garden since we had a drought in May and June. In 2024 the established perennials continued to flourish. We solicited names for the garden from the congregation and settled on Love the Earth Garden.

An Invitation



Today the garden is thriving with over 500 plants including 3 trees. This spring we plan to complete the path from the garden up to the parking lot. In the summer, you will see and delivery system that could provide water to the garden 400 feet away.

We were fortunate to obtain one of the first grants from Partners for Climate Action of the Hudson Valley to help with the cost, but individual donors amany pollinators there and in the winter the birds come to feast on the seed pods. Please take a stroll through the Love the Earth Garden and enjoy the beauty and observe nature at its best. Bring your phone or camera and send us photos. The garden may not be as well-kept as your favorite botanical garden, but it is beautiful for those who love the earth and want to see pollinators flourish.
